FEH Design Visits Argyle

An inquisitive audience showed up to the Argyle EMS building on June 9 to hear a presentation on strategies for getting a new space for the Library. Building Committee Co-Chair Monica Hodgson (at right in photo) introduced AIA member and Principal Architect of FEH Design of Dubuque, IA, Christy Monk. Monk provided an overview of the steps required to make the vision a reality. Attendees learned how FEH has completed 30 successful library projects in communities both large and small around Wisconsin.

Monk discussed FEH's model for library

projects that includes how people can be involved in the design process leading to a final product that truly meets the needs of the community. The Argyle Public Library serves the Village of Argyle as well as the seven nearby townships and beyond, so reaching out to all the current and future library users will be an important effort. Additional Information about the New Library Site Selection

In addition to the activities in the above checklist, the Building Committee has recently been in communication with the Argyle-Adams Fire Department whose current facilities do not meet the needs of today's firefighting professionals or modern equipment. A joint Fire Department-Library project is being explored as a possibility.

About the Building Committee

The Committee is made up of 15 community members working to find a larger space for the Argyle Public Library. The need for a larger library was recognized as far back as 2004. A formal space assessment completed in 2020 said that a community Argyle's size should have a library with a minimum of 3000-4000 square feet of space, compared to the current library of only 900 square feet. The most critical factor is that the current library is not fully accessible to those using walkers, strollers, and wheelchairs. It also lacks sufficient space for children's story times and for chairs for people to sit. Why do this now? A new crop of programs, stimulus funds, and foundation grants has become available to help pay for a library project like this, and the Committee sees this as the right time to move forward.
